**DEBTORS' OBJECTION TO CLAIM NO. 136 FILED BY HUMANA, INC.,
HUMANA INSURANCE COMPANY, AND THEIR AFFILIATES**

(Reclassification of Claim)

The above-captioned debtors and debtors in possession (collectively, the “Debtors”) submit this objection (the “Objection”) for entry of an order, substantially in the form attached hereto as **Exhibit A** (the “Proposed Order”), pursuant to sections 105 and 502 of title 11 of the United States Code (the “Bankruptcy Code”), Rule 3007 of the Federal Rules of Bankruptcy Procedure (the “Bankruptcy Rules”), and Rule 3007-1 of the Local Rules of the United States Bankruptcy Court for the Northern District of Georgia (the “Local Rules”), (i) reclassifying the purported secured claim filed by Humana, Inc., Humana Insurance Company, and Their Affiliates (collectively, “Humana”) and (ii) granting related relief. In support of this Objection, the Debtors respectfully state as follows:

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JURISDICTION AND VENUE

1. The United States Bankruptcy Court for the Northern District of Georgia (the “Court”) has jurisdiction over this matter pursuant to 28 U.S.C. §§ 157 and 1334. This matter is a core proceeding within the meaning of 28 U.S.C. § 157(b)(2).

2. Venue is proper in the Court pursuant to 28 U.S.C. §§ 1408 and 1409.

3. The statutory and legal predicates for the relief requested herein are sections 105(a) and 502 of the Bankruptcy Code, Bankruptcy Rule 3007, Local Rule 3007-1, and the *Second Amended and Restated General Order 26-2019, Procedures for Complex Chapter 11 Cases*, dated February 6, 2023 (the “Complex Case Procedures”).

BACKGROUND

A. The Chapter 11 Cases

4. On March 16, 2025 (the “Petition Date”), each of the Debtors filed a voluntary petition for relief under chapter 11 of the Bankruptcy Code with this Court.

5. The Debtors continue to operate their businesses and manage their properties as debtors in possession pursuant to sections 1107(a) and 1108 of the Bankruptcy Code.

6. On March 31, 2025, the United States Trustee for Region 21 (the “U.S. Trustee”) appointed an official committee of unsecured creditors (the “Committee”) in the above-captioned chapter 11 cases (the “Chapter 11 Cases”). *See Appointment and Notice of Committee of Creditors Holding Unsecured Claims* [D.I. 111].

7. No request has been made for the appointment of a trustee or an examiner.

8. On April 29, 2025, the Court entered the *Order (I) Fixing Deadlines for Filing Proofs of Claim and (II) Approving the Form and Manner of Notice Thereof* [D.I. 283] (the “Bar Date Order”). The Bar Date Order (a) established June 23, 2025 at 11:59 p.m. (prevailing Eastern Time) (the “General Bar Date”) as the last day for creditors that are not governmental units

to file proofs of claim, proofs of interest, and requests for payment of administrative expense claims under Bankruptcy Code section 503(b)(9); (b) established September 12, 2025 at 11:59 p.m. (prevailing Eastern Time) (the “Governmental Bar Date”) as the last day for creditors that are governmental units to file proofs of claim, proofs of interest; and (c) approved a form of bar date notice, proof of claim form, and other procedures.

9. Additional information regarding the Debtors’ businesses, capital structure, and the circumstances leading to the filing of these Chapter 11 Cases is set forth in the *Declaration of Andrew D.J. Hede in Support of Chapter 11 Petitions and First Day Pleadings* [D.I. 8].

B. The Plan and Disclosure Statement

10. On June 24, 2025, the Debtors filed the (i) *Second Amended Plan of Liquidation of AFH Air Pros, LLC and its Debtor Affiliates* [D.I. 479] (as may be further amended, supplemented, or otherwise modified from time to time, and including all exhibits thereto, the “Plan”) and *Second Amended Disclosure Statement for the Second Amended Chapter 11 Plan of AFH Air Pros, LLC and its Debtor Affiliates* [D.I. 480] (as may be further amended, modified, or supplemented from time to time, the “Disclosure Statement”).

11. On June 24, 2025, the Court entered an *Order (A) Approving the Disclosure Statement on an Interim Basis, (B) Establishing Procedures for Solicitation and Tabulation of Votes to Accept or Reject the Plan, (C) Approving the Form of Ballot and Solicitation Materials, (D) Establishing Voting Record Date, (E) Fixing the Date, Time, and Place for the Hearing on Final Approval of the Disclosure Statement and Confirmation of the Plan and the Deadline for Filing Objections Thereto, and (F) Approving Related Notice Procedures and Deadlines* [D.I. No. 477], which scheduled a hearing to consider final approval of the Disclosure Statement and confirmation of the Plan for August 6, 2025 (the “Confirmation Hearing”).

C. The Humana Claim

12. On June 19, 2025, Humana filed a proof of claim in the Debtors' cases (the "Humana Claim"), asserting a secured claim in the amount of \$175,000.00 against Air Pros One Source LLC ("AP One Source"), based on an alleged default judgment. A copy of the Humana Claim is on file with the Debtors' claims and noticing agent, Verita, as Claim No. 136.

13. For the reasons set forth below, the Debtors object to the Humana Claim.

RELIEF REQUESTED

14. By this Objection, the Debtors request that the Court enter the Proposed Order, pursuant to section 502(b) of the Bankruptcy Code, Bankruptcy Rule 3007, and Local Rule 3007-1, reclassifying the Humana Claim from secured to general unsecured status, as indicated in further detail below.

BASIS FOR RELIEF REQUESTED

15. Bankruptcy Code section 502 provides, in pertinent part, that "[a] claim or interest, proof of which is filed under section 501 of [the Bankruptcy Code], is deemed allowed, unless a party in interest . . . objects." 11 U.S.C. § 502(a). The debtor has a duty to object to the allowance of any claim that is improper. See 11 U.S.C. § 1107(a).

16. When asserting a proof of claim against a bankrupt estate, a claimant must allege facts that, if true, would support a finding that the debtor is legally liable to the claimant. *See In re Allegheny Int'l, Inc.*, 954 F.2d 167, 173 (3d Cir. 1992). Where the claimant alleges sufficient facts to support its claim, its claim is afforded prima facie validity. *See id.*; *see also* Bankruptcy Rule 3001(f) (a properly executed and filed proof of claim "constitute[s] prima facie evidence of the validity and amount of the claim").

17. A party wishing to dispute a claim's validity must produce evidence sufficient to negate the claim's prima facie validity. *See Allegheny*, 954 F.2d at 173–74. Once an objecting

party produces such evidence, the burden shifts back to the claimant to prove the validity of his or her claim by a preponderance of the evidence. *Id.* at 174; *see also Dollinger v. BV Retail, LLC (In re S&Q Shack, LLC)*, 2015 Bankr. LEXIS 1166, at *6-7 (N.D. Ga. Feb. 13, 2015); *Chambliss v. Oakwood Acceptance Corp. (In re Chambliss)*, 315 B.R. 166, 169 (Bankr. S.D. Ga. 2004). Ultimately, the burden of persuasion is on the claimant. *See In re Moss*, No. 94- 11959, 1995 WL 17005342, at *1 (Bankr. S.D. Ga. Sept. 28, 1995).

18. The Debtors have reviewed the Humana Claim and their books and records maintained in the ordinary course of business. Based on that review, the Debtors have determined that the Humana Claim does not qualify for secured status and should be reclassified in full as a general unsecured claim.

A. The Humana Claim Is Against a Non-Debtor

19. The Humana Claim was filed against AP One Source. The Debtors acquired the “One Source” business in September 2020. Upon information and belief, the Humana Claim relates to a claim that accrued prior to the Debtors’ acquisition of the One Source business and is not a valid claim against the Debtors. The Humana Claim also fails to include a copy of the judgment or any other documents supporting the claim. Even so, the Debtors only seek through this Objection to reclassify the Humana Claim as a general unsecured claim.

B. Humana’s Lien, if Any, Is Subordinate to Senior Secured Claims

20. The Court’s *Final Order (I) Authorizing the Debtors to Obtain Postpetition Financing, (II) Authorizing the Use of Cash Collateral, and (III) Granting Adequate Protection to Prepetition Secured Parties* [D.I. 255] (the “Final DIP Order”), grants the Debtors’ prepetition and postpetition lenders (collectively, the “Secured Lenders”) a first-priority lien on substantially all

existing and after-acquired property of the Debtors, including any property to which Humana's later-in-time purported judgment could attach.

21. The Plan and Disclosure Statement reflect that the value of the Debtors' assets is insufficient to satisfy the claims of the Secured Lenders in full. *See generally* Plan and Disclosure Statement. Therefore, even assuming that Humana secured a judgment and recorded that judgment against one of the Debtors, the lien created by any such recorded judgment is junior to the first-priority lien of the Secured Lenders and wholly unsecured under section 506(a)(1).

22. If the Humana Claim is not reclassified, the claimant would receive treatment inconsistent with the Bankruptcy Code's priority scheme. Misclassification of claims may lead to disproportionate recoveries and reduce distributions available to similarly situated unsecured creditors. In this case, reclassification will ensure that all creditors receive treatment aligned with the nature of their claims under the Plan.

23. Accordingly, the Debtors object to the secured status of the Humana Claim and respectfully request entry of the Proposed Order reclassifying Claim No. 136 as a general unsecured claim in the amount asserted as of the Petition Date.

RESERVATION OF RIGHTS

24. The Debtors reserve all rights to amend, modify, or supplement this Objection and the Proposed Order, and to file additional objections to any claims filed in these Chapter 11 Cases. The Debtors further reserve all rights, claims, and defenses with respect to any and all claims, including the claim addressed herein. Nothing in this Objection or the Proposed Order shall be deemed to impair, waive, or otherwise limit any such rights, claims, or defenses, all of which are expressly preserved.

NOTICE

25. The Debtors will provide notice of this Objection to the following parties or their respective counsel, if known: (a) the Office of the U.S. Trustee for the Northern District of Georgia, (b) the Committee; (c) the Debtors' prepetition and postpetition lenders and collateral agent; (d) the Limited Service List; (e) Humana; and (f) any party that has requested notice pursuant to Bankruptcy Rule 2002. The Debtors submit that, in light of the nature of the relief requested, no other or further notice need be given.

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CONCLUSION

WHEREFORE, the Debtors request that the Court enter the Proposed Order granting the relief requested herein and such other relief as is just and proper under the circumstances.

reclassifying the Humana Claim; and the Court having jurisdiction over this matter pursuant to 28 U.S.C. §§ 157 and 1334; and the matter being a core proceeding within the meaning of 28 U.S.C. § 157(b)(2); and venue of this proceeding and the Objection in this District being proper pursuant to 28 U.S.C. §§ 1408 and 1409; and the Court being able to issue a final order consistent with Article III of the United States Constitution; and it appearing that due and adequate notice of the Objection has been given under the circumstances; and the Court having reviewed the Objection and having heard the statements in support of the relief requested therein at a hearing before this Court (the “Hearing”); and the Court having determined that the legal and factual bases set forth in the Objection and at the Hearing establish just cause for the relief granted herein; and upon the record of the Hearing, this Court having determined that there is good and sufficient cause for the relief set forth in this Order; and after due deliberation thereon, it is hereby **ORDERED** that:

1. The Objection is SUSTAINED, as set forth herein.
2. The Humana Claim is hereby reclassified from a secured claim to a general unsecured claim in the amount of \$175,000.00. The reclassified Humana Claim shall remain on the claims register as a general unsecured claim, subject to the Debtors’ or other party-in-interest’s further objections on any substantive or non-substantive grounds.
3. Nothing set forth in this Order shall be construed as, or shall in any way constitute, a waiver of the Debtors’ rights to assert objections to the Humana Claim on any additional grounds whatsoever.
4. The Debtors and their claims and noticing agent, Verita, as well as the Clerk of the Court, are authorized to take all such actions as are necessary and appropriate to effectuate the terms of this Order.

5. This Court shall retain jurisdiction with respect to all matters arising from or related to the implementation, interpretation, or enforcement of this Order.
