1. A jailhouse lawyer help me write this motion.
2. From 1993 through 2004 Creditor Thomas was First diagnosed with Schizophrenia, Depression, and Epilepsy by Dr. Navakas, a licensed Psychiatrist at the Stateville Correctional Center in Joliet, IL and prescribed antichotic and antidepressant medications.
3. His diagnosis were confirmed throughout the 2000's including a hospitalization at the Madison Center. A Mental health Facility in South Bend, Indiana.
4. In June of 2004 he was approved For Social Security Disability (S.S.D) For Schizophrenia, Depression, and Epilepsy by the Social Security Administration. Located in Springfield, Illinois. Under his birth Name Leonard Thomas, S.S.N 346-56-9076. For Further verification. Please contact the Social Security Administration 2715 West Monroe St. Springfield, IL 62704 and/or The Harold Washington Social Security Center 600 West Madison St. Chicago, IL 60680.
- 4 1/2 Also Attorney Mrs. Elisabeth Copko located at 53rd. Hyde Park street Chicago, Illinois. She represented him during his appeal to the Social Security Administration in early 2004 and won his appeal
5. From July 31, 2005 through April 10, 2007 while on psychotropic Meds he was arrested in South Bend, Indiana during an altercation with his Uncle, and convicted of Voluntary Manslaughter and sentenced to 40 years in the Indiana Department of Correction (IDOC).
6. In May 2007 he entered the (IDOC) Penal system as a seriously Mentally Ill incarcerated individual and placed on Medically prescribed

psychotropic Meds on and off upto the date of this Motion. Please see Appendix 1. 1. through 30.

7. From 2007 through 2014 Corizon Health, Inc.'s Policies, practices, procedures, and widespread customs in place during that relevant time for diagnosed seriously mentally ill incarcerated prisoners at the Westville Correctional Facility's Westville Control Unit (Supermax) Maximum security prisons 23-hour lockdown segregation Restricted Housing Review Units was so unconstitutional in relations to housing, classification, placement, screening, security, monitoring, evaluating, and treatment of seriously mentally ill prisoner, including Thomas, and his constant placement on 1wk, 2wk, and one month post suicide watch ^{policies} in the supermax was the moving force behind his inadequate and inappropriate medical and mental health treatment, resulting in numerous suicide attempts by hangings, barbiturates overdose, setting his cells on fire, and numerous acts of self-mutilations with major injuries and life long ugly scars, and forced to sleep on an iron frame bed mounted to the floor by the toilet next to the door with ants, bugs, spiders, and mice crawling on him keeping him up all night days at a time. And forced to drink contaminated water, and exposed to excessive force treatment for a duration of one year six months. A violation of our Supreme Court rulings cited in the case of Wilkinson v. Austin, 545 U.S. 209 (2005).
8. Corizon's policies were the direct and proximate cause of his constitutional rights being violated and imposed an atypical significant hardship in relations to the ordinary incidents of prison life. See also Case No. 1:08-cv-01317-TWP.

9. Records show Common Health, Inc.'s Unconstitutional Policies and Defendants were (objectively and subjectively). Deliberate indifferent to Thomas's Medical and Mental health needs. Not only, to his safety and security but also, Failed to protect him from (self-harm) while forcibly (housed) in a (supermax). Ignored and turned a blind-eye to the American Psychiatric Association's Diagnostic And Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-IV), regarding his noted diagnosis of chronic problems. Axis I Anxiety. Axis I Paranoid type schizophrenia. Axis II Antisocial Personality disorder, and Axis III Intervertebral disc disorder while on psychotropic meds. Antipsychotics and antidepressants for audio visual hallucinations and to combat his re-occurring ongoing psychiatric symptoms and suicidal ideation. Before he was transferred on June 26, 2015 to one of the (IDOC's) Mental Health Facilities. The Wabash Valley Correctional Facility (WVDF), for specialized mental health treatment, in a specialized mental health facility. And retaliatory transfer from (WVDF). Back to the same (supermax) for another duration of 1 year 9 months for filing grievances and law suits on their associates and colleagues. Please see *Rasho v. Elie*, 856 F.3d 469.
10. Thomas attaches his ^{recent} official Certificate of his prison account for the last 6 months. Please see App. 2. 1. through 12.
11. Thomas has an eighth grade education and asked for help from a jailhouse ^{lawyer} to diligently make a good-faith effort to obtain an attorney on his own but to no avail. Please see Appendix 3. pages 1. through 15.

12. It grieves me to say that on April 26, 2025 Thomas was Forced to seek help From another jailhouse lawyer to help write and send an official letter to the Clerk of The Bankruptcy Court. Mr. Jason S. Brockner, c/o Tehum Care Services, Inc., Debtor, Chapter 11. Case No. 23-90086. Informing the Honorable Court of his Seriously Mentally ill diagnosis and respectfully asking the Court what's going on because he did Not understand the Proposed Jointed Chapter 11 Plan Nor Texas's Bankruptcy Proceeding. He received No response
 13. Despite The Honorable Judge Christopher Lopez's August 07, 2025 DECISION AND ORDER ON YES CARE'S OWNINIONS MOTION TO ENJOIN PLAINTIFFS FROM PROSECTING CASES AGAINST RELEASED PARTIES. Creditor Leonard Thomas still has Not received Clarity From Tehum Care Services Settlement For Case No. 23-90086. Please also see Appendix 4. Pages 1. through 12.

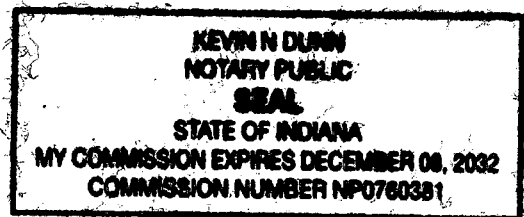

INDIANA VIOLATING RIGHTS OF MENTALLY ILL, FEDERAL JUDGE SAYS

Mentally ill prisoners placed in isolation and deprived of adequate medical treatment experience hallucinations, depression and other symptoms. Since 2007, at least 11 of these prisoners have committed suicide. On Monday, a federal judge ruled that such treatment by the Indiana Department of Correction violates the Eighth Amendment prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment.

"More than 200 years of scholarship has recognized that which should be obvious to all: Placing seriously mentally ill persons in segregated settings featuring prolonged isolation and little to no treatment merely increases mental illness and is incredibly damaging," said ACLU of Indiana Legal Director Ken Falk. "The ACLU of Indiana is happy that the Court has entered this decision that will force the Indiana Department of Correction to provide minimally adequate treatment to prisoners who will one day rejoin society."

Judge Tanya Walton Pratt in the United States District Court for the Southern District of Indiana concluded that the Indiana Department of Correction is violating the Eighth Amendment's prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment by placing hundreds of offenders with serious mental illnesses in segregated confinement. Around 100 mentally ill prisoners are being held in isolation, but the ruling will affect hundreds, if not thousands of inmates across the state.

"This confinement generally consists of requiring offenders to spend 23 hours a day or more in their cells, with very limited access to treatment, and often causes significant worsening of symptoms and illness, including hallucinations, paranoia, depression, self-harm, or even suicide for persons with pre-existing mental health conditions. The State has more than 1,600 segregation beds at 14 facilities, including the Indiana State Prison at Michigan City, the Indiana Women's Prison in Indianapolis, and prisons at Branchville, Pendleton, Plainfield, Putnamville, Rockville, Wabash Valley and Westville. IDOC also possesses a specific psychiatric unit at the New Castle Correctional Facility. The Court found that this unit features prisoner isolation and infrequent treatment similar to that experienced in the Department's segregation units.

In its decision, the Court noted that nearly 50 percent of inmate suicides occurring within the Department of Correction since 2007 were committed by mentally ill offenders in a segregated setting, and that the evidence "overwhelmingly show that decompensation is psychologically painful to a mentally ill prisoner." The Court also found that the harmful effects of

segregation on mentally ill offenders were known to the Department of Correction.

This decision follows a week-long trial that took place in July of 2011 in a case brought by the ACLU of Indiana on behalf of the Indiana Protection and Advocacy Services Commission and a class of inmates with serious mental illnesses. While the Court found that the plaintiffs' constitutional rights have been violated, it has not yet issued an order regarding the appropriate remedy.

David Smith, Interim Legal Services Director of the Indiana Protection and Advocacy Services Commission, said, "As both co-plaintiff and co-counsel in the case, IPAS strongly agrees with the ruling of the Court stating that the actions and conduct of the Indiana Department of Correction showed 'deliberate indifference' to the basic care and welfare of inmates in IDOC with serious mental illness who were not provided treatment and kept in segregated settings to their detriment. IPAS looks forward to working with and assisting the Court in determining an appropriate remedy to this problem, which will stop the non-treatment and mistreatment of inmates in IDOC with serious mental illness, now and in the future."

ACLU of Indiana Executive Director Jane Henegar said, "A civilized society treats everyone with humanity. That is the inspiration contained in the Eighth Amendment's prohibition against cruel and unusual punishment and the motivation of the ACLU of Indiana in this case."

The decision is entered in the United States District Court, Southern District of Indiana Indianapolis Division as Case No. 1:08-cv-01317-TWP-MJD.

We recently had another formal conference in Court to discuss the progress that the DOC is making with regard to developing constitutionally adequate programming for seriously mentally ill prisoners in segregation or segregated-like environments such as the New Castle Psychiatric Unit. As you know, the Court did issue a decision on December 31, 2012, concluding that the Eighth Amendment rights of these prisoners were being violated by the DOC's failure to provide appropriate care and treatment. There is no final judgment in this case. However, the DOC has been working to provide constitutional alternatives to how it formerly treated these prisoners.

The Department indicated that it is finishing up developing both housing and treatment space at Pendleton. Prisoners will begin to be moved there at some point in January of 2014. Prisoners will be moved slowly – starting at 5 prisoners a week. The new program at Pendleton will feature daily group therapy and a lot of out-of-cell time. This will be a great improvement to the conditions that gave rise to the lawsuit.

The representatives of the Department also stated that changes were coming to New Castle to make sure that all prisoners are out of their cells at least 10 hours a week for therapeutic programming.

Finally, we discussed what was being done to assist seriously mentally ill female prisoners who are currently in segregation. The DOC is planning to put seriously mentally ill women in segregation in a unit at the Indiana Women's Prison where they can receive 10 hours a week of out-of-cell therapeutic programming.

It does appear that the DOC is working very hard to develop excellent programming. We will continue to closely monitor this.

Following the hearing the Judge ordered the parties to file a status report no later than January 31, 2014. Hopefully by that time all of the above tentative plans will have been finalized. If we wish, we can, after this report, ask for another hearing with the Court.

Agency: Mentally ill inmates receiving better care

Advocates will get a firmer hand look at Indiana's criminal justice system of mentally ill prisoners since a federal judge criticized the Department of Correction for acting "deliberately indifferent" toward the prisoners' plight. Representatives of a state commission that advocates for the rights of the disabled and lawyers for the American Civil Liberties Union of Indiana are

scheduled to tour a new unit at Pendleton Correctional Facility today. U.S. District Judge Tanya Walton Pratt found more than a year ago that the prison agency's treatment of its nearly 6,000 mentally ill inmates was inadequate, and ordered it to do more. Pratt ruled that by simply locking mentally ill prisoners up in their cells without adequate treatment, the state system was violating the inmates' constitutional right against cruel and unusual punishment.

The 2008 class action lawsuit said inmates were routinely placed in isolation and they and their mental health caretakers often had to yell at each other through solid cell doors instead of meeting face to face. David Fathi, who heads the national ACLU Prison Project, said Tuesday that mentally ill inmates across the U.S. are routinely held in solitary confinement for days or years and often mutilate or kill themselves. In 2005, an inmate at Indiana's Wabash Correctional Facility committed suicide by setting himself on fire in his cell.

"The Indiana case is definitely part of a trend, Fathi said. "Prisons and jails have become the asylums of last resort, and judges are insisting they do a better job of caring for the mentally ill." The ACLU has handled similar cases in Massachusetts, South Carolina, Arizona and Mississippi, Fathi said. He cited government figures showing that as many as one-third the nation's prison inmates are believed to have a mental illness.

The civil rights group also represents the Indiana Protection and Advocacy Services Commission in its suit against the DOC. Ken Falk, the ACLU of Indiana's legal director, said Tuesday the Pendleton unit now appears to be "state of the art" and puts Indiana ahead of other states in its treatment of mentally ill inmates. Advocates reported a lack of progress to the court last fall, but prison officials say they've made improvements since then, providing special training to about 300 prison staff and is in the process of starting up special units at

prisons in Pendleton, New Castle, Wabash Valley and the Indiana Women's Prison in Indianapolis. The new mental health unit at the Pendleton Correctional Facility, about 25 miles northeast of Indianapolis, went into operation early last month and currently houses five offenders. Eventually, officials plan for the unit to house 264 inmates, the Department of Correction said. Advocates say the number of mentally ill people in prison has risen over the years as states have cut budgets for treatment.

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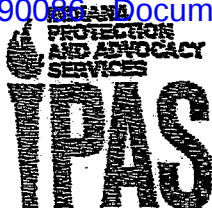

Indiana Protection and Advocacy Services (IPAS) received your letter on January 26, 2015, regarding inappropriate and/or a lack of mental health treatment in the Indiana Department of Correction (IDOC). As you may know, IPAS sued IDOC in 2008 claiming that IDOC was placing seriously mentally ill inmates in segregation to their detriment, and further failing to provide them with appropriate mental health care and treatment. In 2010, the court granted certification of a class that includes all seriously mentally ill inmates in segregation in IDOC, and that class of inmates is a plaintiff in the case.

If you suffer from a serious mental illness and are in segregation, you are included in the certified class for the lawsuit, and what relief the suit produces will apply to your situation in some way. While the case is pending, IPAS cannot provide individual advocacy services for individuals diagnosed with a mental health disorder.

IPAS is without the resources to open further prison cases that involve individuals with a mental health diagnosis at this time. Contact information for additional resources that may be able to address your concerns has been enclosed for your convenience.

**DECISION AND ORDER ON YESCARE'S OMNIBUS MOTION TO ENJOIN
PLAINTIFFS FROM PROSECUTING CASES AGAINST RELEASED PARTIES**

(RE: ECF No. 2160)

CHS TX, Inc. d/b/a YesCare and certain of its affiliates are parties to consensual third-party releases approved under Tehum's confirmed Joint Chapter 11 Plan. YesCare recently filed a motion seeking to enjoin certain parties from litigating against YesCare and related parties based on the third-party releases.¹ The motion is partially granted and partially denied.

BACKGROUND

In March 2025, the Court entered an order confirming the Plan ("Confirmation Order"). The Plan incorporated a settlement agreement between Tehum, YesCare and certain of its affiliates ("YesCare Parties"), the Official Committee of Tort Claimants, and the Official Committee of Unsecured Creditors.

The settlement resolved, among other things, Tehum's estate causes of action against YesCare Parties about a Texas divisional merger and related acts.² In exchange, YesCare Parties agreed to pay \$50 million. The funds were split evenly between a personal injury and/or wrongful death trust and a general unsecured claim trust.³ The Plan also provided for consensual third-party releases between, among others, YesCare Parties and personal injury and/or wrongful death ("PI/WD") claimants.

The Plan defines "Released Parties" as:

(a) the Debtor; (b) Russell Perry, the Debtor's Chief Restructuring Officer; (c) the Committees and their respective members; (d) the Professionals; (e) the GUC Trustee; (f) the PI/WD Trustee; (g) the Settlement Parties; (h) M2 EquityCo LLC; (i) Valitas Intermediate Holdings Inc.; (j) Valitas Health Services, Inc.; (k) M2 Pharmacorr Equity Holdings LLC; (l) Pharmacorr/M2 LLC; (m) Pharmacorr Holdings LLC; (n) Endeavor Distribution LLC; (o) Yes Care Holdings LLC; (p) Sigma RM, LLC; (q) DG Realty Management LLC; (r) Scaracor LLC; (s) Yitzchak Lefkowitz a/k/a Isaac Lefkowitz; (t) Sara Ann Tirschwell; (u) Ayodeji Olawale Ladele; (v) Beverly Michelle Rice; (w) Jeffrey Scott King; (x) Jennifer Lynne Finger; (y) Frank Jeffrey Sholey; (z) FTI Capital Advisors, LLC, and for each Entity listed in (a) through (z), each of their respective current and former officers, directors, managers, employees, contractors, agents, attorneys, and other professional advisors, Insiders, and Affiliates.⁴

The Court approved voting and solicitation procedures order ("Solicitation Order") required solicitation packages to be sent to eligible claimholders.⁵ PI/WD claimants were classified in Classes 6-8 of the Plan and were entitled to receive a ballot and an "Opt-Out Release Form."⁶ A PI/WD claimant who did not opt out of the third-party releases by checking the appropriate box on the Opt-Out Release Form was deemed a "Consenting PI/WD Claimant." Consenting claimants' claims were channeled to the PI/WD trust on the effective date of the Plan. Under the Plan, channeled claimants participated in the \$50 million settlement and released claims against YesCare Parties and other "Released Parties." Claimants who opted out of the third-party releases did not participate in the settlement and could pursue recovery against third parties in the tort system—including YesCare Parties—on theories of successor liability.⁷

The Solicitation Order also provided that holders of general unsecured claims would receive an Opt-Out Release Form. It does not appear that any of the parties identified in YesCare's motion fall into this category. But it would not change anything in this Order anyway.

In connection with Plan confirmation, the solicitation agent filed a certificate of service of the solicitation materials ("Solicitation Certificate of Service").⁸ The parties YesCare seeks to enjoin were not all served the same materials.⁹ Some parties received a ballot and an Opt-Out Release Form, some received Plan related materials but did not receive an Opt-Out Release Form, and some did not receive any Plan related materials. The solicitation agent also filed a Declaration Regarding Solicitation and Tabulation of Votes ("Voting Declaration").¹⁰ The Voting Declaration states that the solicitation agent posted certain solicitation materials, including the Plan and the Disclosure Statement on a public access website.¹¹ The Voting Declaration also states that publication notice was published in the Prison Legal News.¹² And that the solicitation agent served solicitation packages, which should include an Opt-Out Release Form and a ballot, on all holders of claims in Classes 6, 7, and 8.¹³

YESCARE'S MOTION

YesCare seeks an order enjoining certain parties from continuing to litigate in federal and state courts against YesCare Parties. YesCare identified over 100 parties in chart who allegedly did not submit an Opt-Out Release Form.¹⁴ The chart identified parties by name, the case caption for the litigation, and the form of notice purportedly provided to each party.¹⁵ YesCare asserts that each listed party received sufficient notice of the consensual third-party releases in the Plan, and that the channeling injunction under the Plan bars them from prosecuting their respective lawsuits. Over twenty parties objected.

ANALYSIS

The Southern District of Texas Complex Case Procedures require a creditor to receive a notice that provides a box to check to indicate assent or opposition to proposed consensual third-party releases in a chapter 11 plan.¹⁶ The Solicitation

Order followed the Complex Case Procedures and required parties asked for a consensual third-party release to receive a Court approved Opt-Out Release Form.¹⁷

Some parties YesCare seeks to enjoin were served an Opt-Out Release Form and a ballot.¹⁸ The parties listed on Exhibit A to this Order did not opt out and are therefore bound by the consensual third-party releases in the Plan. The parties in Exhibit A are enjoined from continuing to litigate against any specifically named Released Party (i.e., defined parties in (a)-(z)).¹⁹

There are separate questions about whether the third-party releases cover each of the claims and claimants asserted in an underlying litigation. The Court does not have enough evidence in the record to make those determinations. For example, the third-party releases cover current and former employees of Tehum. Objector "Lyles" argued at the hearing on YesCare's motion that a certain doctor defendant was not a Released Party.²⁰ There was not sufficient evidence in the record to decide this issue. YesCare or any affected party may separately seek rulings on such matters in the underlying litigation or before this Court.

The parties listed on Exhibit B to this Order were not served an Opt-Out Release Form. A few parties were served some solicitation materials that did not include an Opt-Out Release Form. For other parties, YesCare relies on publication notice and other forms of notice unrelated to plan confirmation. YesCare argues that the publication notice was approved by the Court in the Solicitation Order and affirmed as appropriate in the Confirmation Order. Here is an example of YesCare's argument: objector "Clark-El" is currently an inmate in a Maryland correctional facility.²¹ In 2022 he started a lawsuit in the U.S District Court for the District of Maryland against 13 individuals employed by Corizon Health, Inc. n/k/a YesCare.²² Clark-El was not served with a solicitation package, including an Opt-Out Release Form. But YesCare argues that Clark-El is bound by the third-party releases because of publication notice.²³

YesCare also argues that notices about the bankruptcy case in the underlying litigation put some parties on notice and triggered a duty for claimants to monitor the bankruptcy court docket for matters that may impact their rights. For example, objector "Fletcher" is currently an inmate in a Maryland correctional facility.²⁴ Fletcher sued YesCare, Tehum, and certain other defendants in a Maryland District Court.²⁵ YesCare claims he was put on notice about 2025 plan confirmation issues—

including releases between third parties—because Tehum filed a Suggestion of Bankruptcy in November 2023 stating that Tehum had started a bankruptcy case.²⁶ There is no evidence Fletcher received an Opt-Out Release Form or any other notice about the Plan or its terms.

Each of these arguments is wrong. First, there can never be constructive notice of a consensual release between third-parties under a chapter 11 plan. The Court approved publication notice was not for consensual third-party releases. The plan proponents asked the Court to approve publication notice because it would provide sufficient notice of the deadline to object to plan confirmation and the confirmation hearing date for unknown creditors.²⁷ There was a separate procedure approved in the Solicitation Order that required parties to receive an Opt-Out Release Form, which gave them the right to check a box and opt out of the releases. Every party asked for a third-party release had to receive an Opt-Out Release Form. These parties never received an Opt-Out Release Form, so they cannot be bound by the third-party releases. There is more. The parties YesCare seeks to enjoin are litigating against Tehum and/or YesCare Parties. Therefore, these parties are known creditors constitutionally entitled to actual notice—and not publication notice—before their litigation claims could be released under the Plan. *See, e.g., Mullane v. Cent. Hanover Bank & Tr. Co.*, 339 U.S. 306, 313–15 (1950); *In re Placid Oil Co.*, 753 F.3d 151, 154 (5th Cir. 2014). These claimants had to receive actual notice—i.e., the Opt-Out Release Form. And, again, the Solicitation Order required it too.²⁸

Finally, it appears there were some parties who were served an Opt-Out Release Form and a Notice of Non-Voting Status instead of a ballot. These parties are identified on Exhibit C to this Order. The Court will set a separate hearing for these parties to consider additional legal considerations. The Court makes no finding or ruling on these parties in this Order.

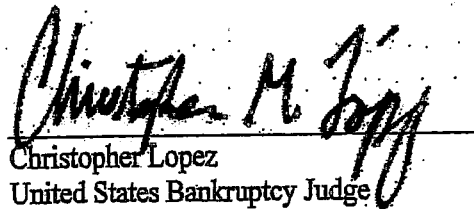


ORDER

For the reasons stated above, the Court finds and Orders that:

1. The parties listed on Exhibit A to this Order were served an Opt-Out Release Form and are bound by the consensual third-party releases in the Plan. These parties are restrained and enjoined from taking any action to prosecute any causes of action for the purpose of directly, indirectly, or derivatively collecting, recovering, or receiving payment, satisfaction, or recovery from any Released Party based on released Causes of Action (as such terms are defined in the Plan).
2. The parties listed on Exhibit B to this Order were not served an Opt-Out Release Form and are not bound by the consensual third-party releases in the Plan.
3. The parties listed on Exhibit C to this Order are subject to another hearing at a date to be determined.
4. The Court retains jurisdiction to interpret and enforce this Order.
